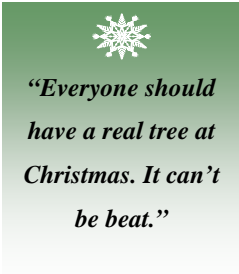
O Christmas Tree

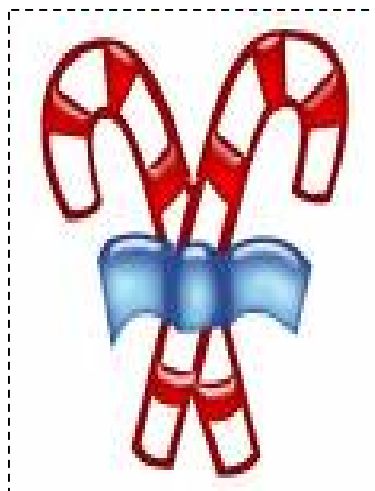
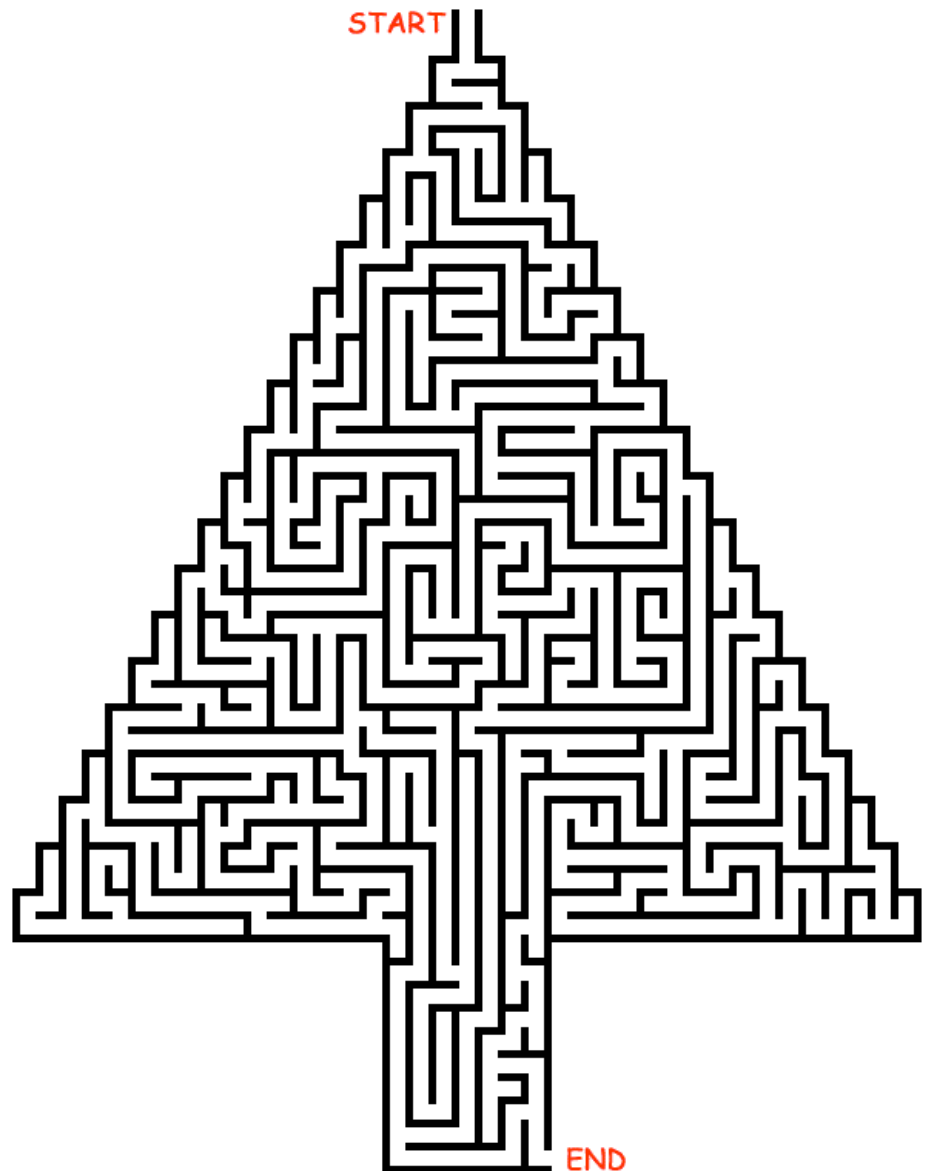

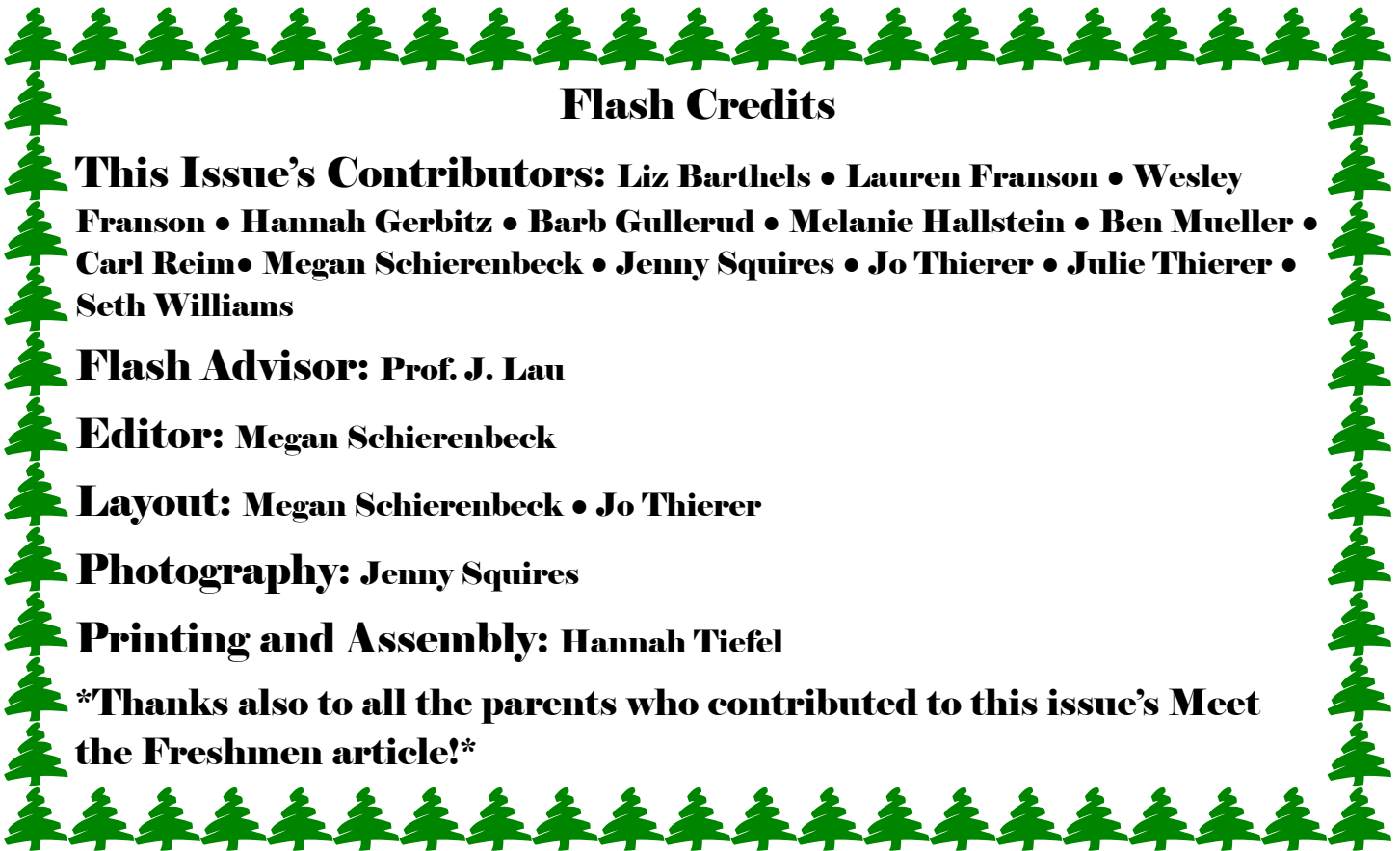
