



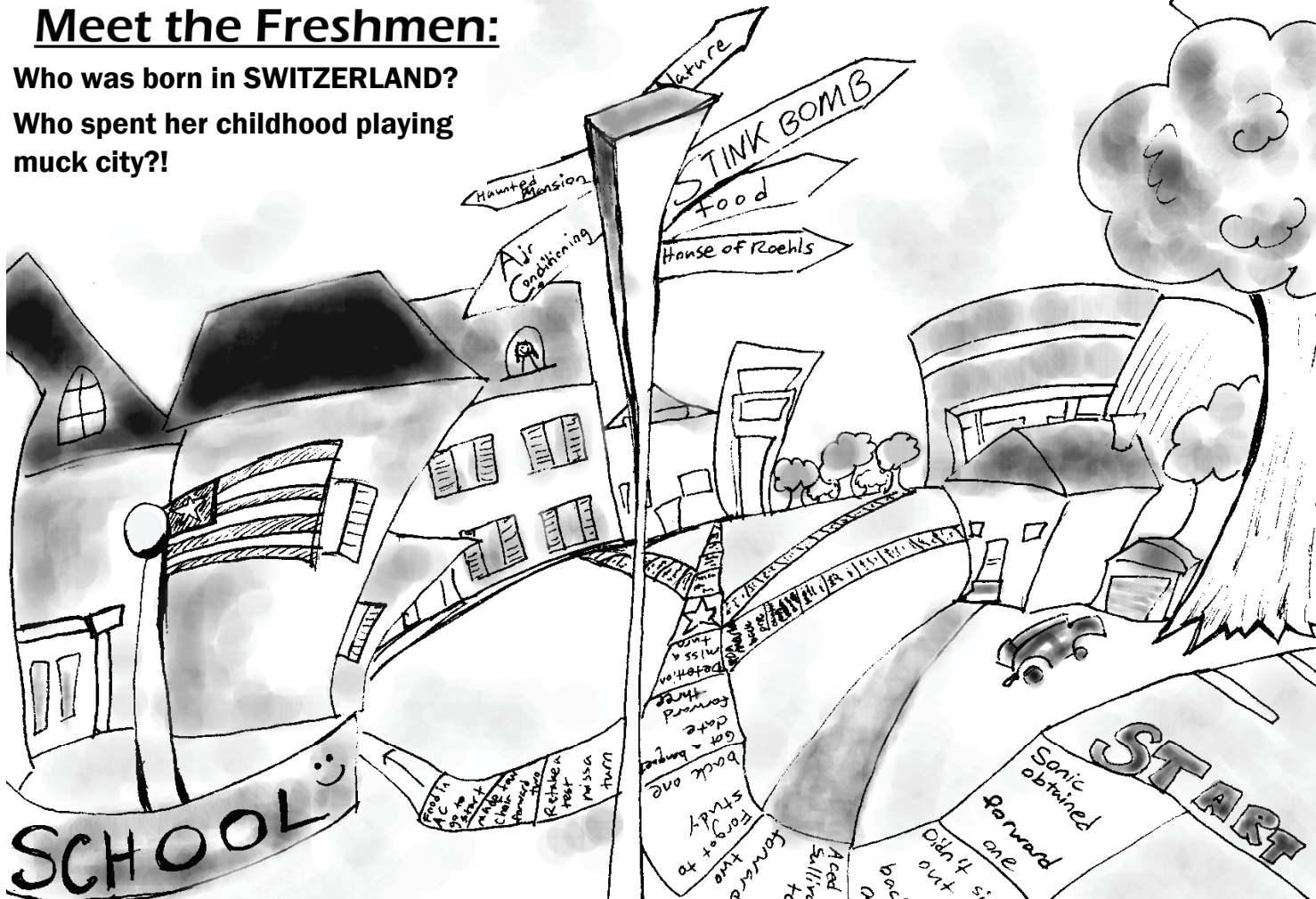

Ingredients

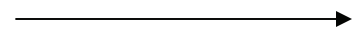
- 2 lb. ground beef, brown and remove grease

- 2 16 oz. cans kidney , 1 light, 1 dark, undrained
- 2 tsp. salt
- 1 tsp. black pepper
- 1 tsp. cumin
- 2 Tbs. chili powder

After ground beef is prepared and drained, add all other ingredients and simmer for 7-10 hours. If too spicy, add a sprinkle of cinnamon.

K: I got dormed twice and one time was because I thought it was Sunday so I didn't clean my room, but it turned out to be Saturday.

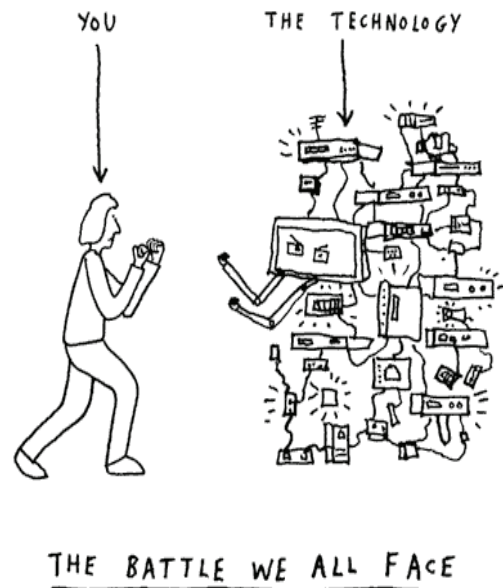
J: You had checks on Saturdays?

J: What is something interesting that nobody really knows about you?

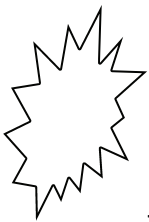
K: I can do the worm. I will only do it at weddings though if the bride requests it.

Q: So, you've been around here for a while; any words of wisdom?

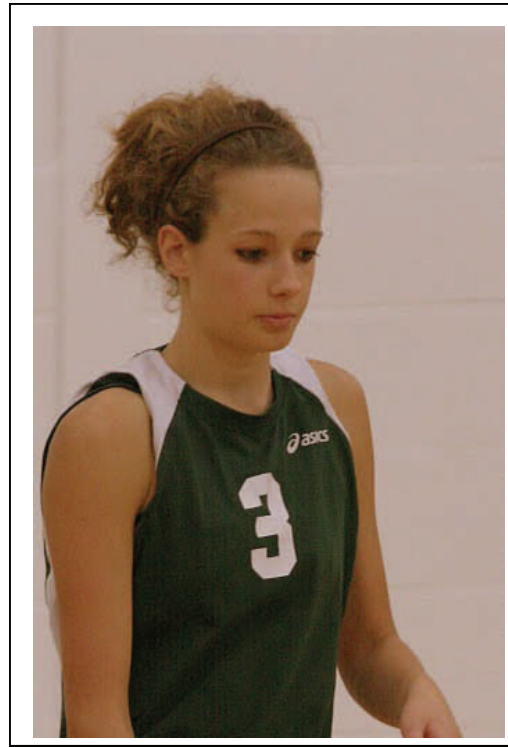
A: If you can dream it, you can do it. Also, don't be afraid to let people in. It's not easy, but sometimes it's completely worth it. Please go green.

R: (laughs) The coolest thing? Leah was with me on my b-day at the water park.

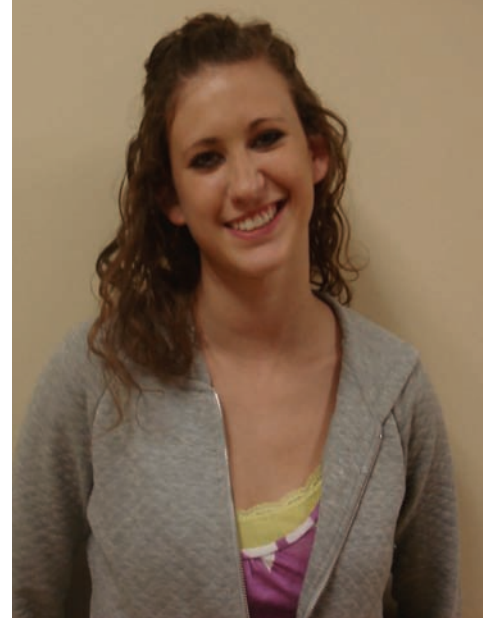
L: What's your favorite animal and why?

R: A giraffe, because if I could be any animal in the world I would be a giraffe so I could be super tall

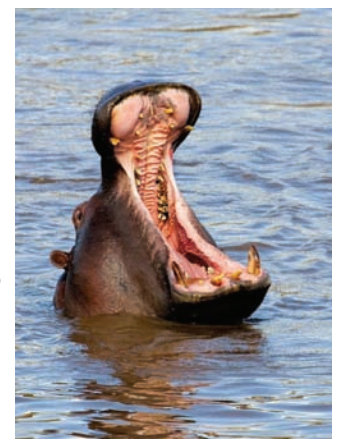

the rhythm to my taste-buds.

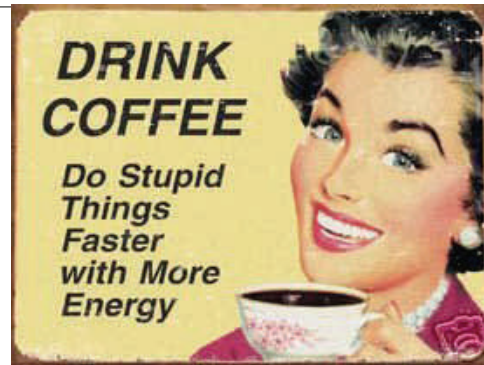
Coffee is rich in emotion, bringing satisfaction and love

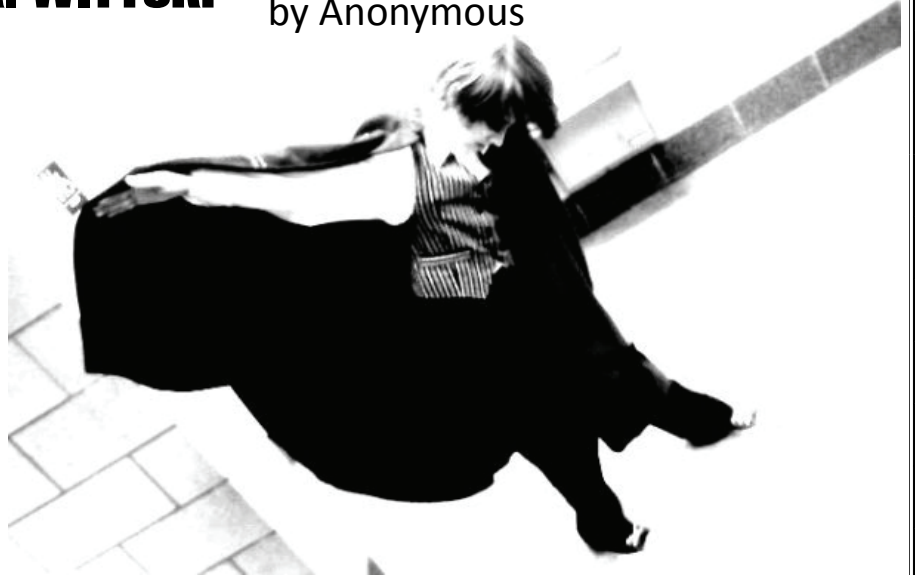

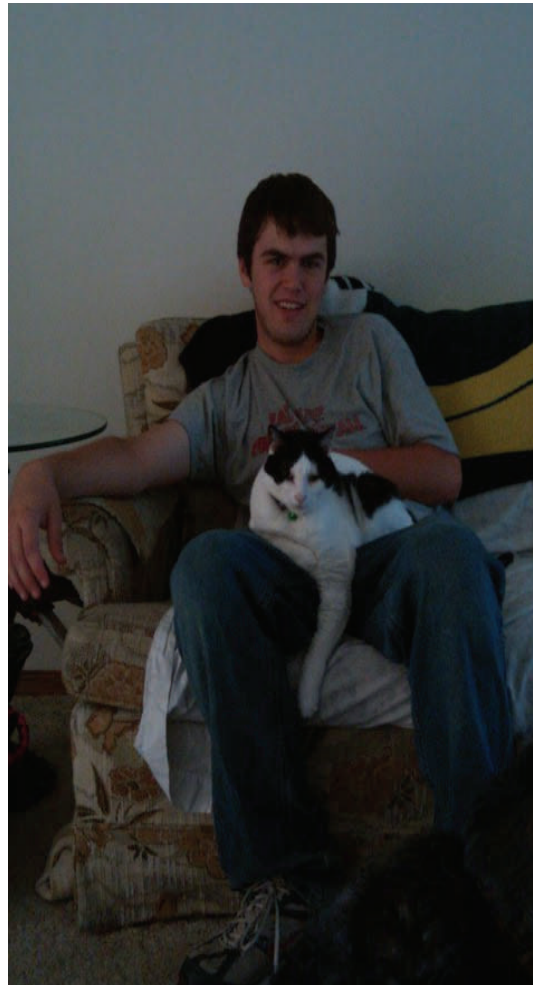
